However, if students prefer to select their own topic, they may do so, provided it falls within the boundaries of the course's core themes and learning outcomes, and is subject to teacher approval. Words limitations

The magazine article should be crafted within a word count range of 400 to 1000 words, allowing students to explore into their chosen topic with sufficient depth while adhering to the constraints of the assignment.

Deadlines

The deadline for submitting the article is set before the first terminal exam, providing students with ample time to conduct research, write, draft, and refine their work. However, in exceptional cases where circumstances may warrant an extension or adjustment to the deadline, the concerned subject teacher holds the authority to make such decisions.

Outlines

Technical guidelines

When writing a magazine article, use Times New Roman font with the title set to font size 14, subheadings at font size 12, and the body text also in font size 12. Line spacing should be set to 1.15, and margins should be 1 inch on all sides to provide ample white space. The word count should range from 400 to 1000 words, with justified text alignment for a clean and professional appearance. To enhance readability, keep paragraphs short and focused, especially in online magazines where readers tend to skim. Incorporate relevant photographs, illustrations, graphs, or charts to complement the text. Ensure that all data, statistics, and claims are accurate and up-to-date, and always cite reliable sources. Maintain consistency in tense, person (first, second, or third), and point of view throughout the article. The tone should match the publication and its audience, ranging from formal and informative to casual and conversational, with a slightly informal, engaging tone often preferred in magazines. Adhering to these technical guidelines ensures both consistency and readability throughout the article.

Plagiarism policy

Articles submitted by students must not exceed 10% plagiarism, as detected by the college's plagiarism software, **iThenticate**. If an article contains more than 10% plagiarism, the student will be notified and asked to correct the plagiarized sections and resubmit the article. If, after corrections, the article still contains more than 10% plagiarism, it will be rejected. This policy ensures that all submissions reflect genuine effort and uphold academic standards.
